Understanding the Financial Obligations of Studying Overseas

Wright State University non-resident tuition is one of the lowest in the state of Ohio among accredited institutions because we are a state operated not-for-profit school. The cost of living in Dayton Ohio is also very reasonable at 14% lower than the national average. The College of Business is one of only 182 institutions world-wide that have achieved accreditation by AACSB International in *both* business and accounting. Our accreditation, combined with reasonable tuition rates and a low cost of living makes Wright State University, Raj Soin College of Business the natural choice.

None the less, moving to a foreign country to pursue the dream of an education is an undertaking that requires good preparation, both personally and financially. International students need to fully understand the financial burden of an education in the USA.
